Important Information You Need to Know

To our dismay we found out a few days ago that our MCGS Yahoo email account had been accessed and hacked. Because of this some of you may have received an email that looked like it was from Dawn Kelley, MCGS or another member. If you see an unusual email asking for money of any kind, please delete that email. If possible, please report the hacking to your email provider. Most likely we will never know who did this but by letting others know what happened we can all be safer online.

Here are some tips to stay safe online:

- Always look at the email address of the sender. Look in that address for anything you are not familiar with or appears odd. It may be as small as seeing a space or period in the wrong spot, or as large as coming from a stranger.
- ✓ When you surf the web keep an eye on the top line where it shows you the website address. If that address is not correct you may have been hijacked to another site where hackers can get more complete access to your information.
- ✓ Try to keep your email contact's personal information off the web. You could use an offline program (like Microsoft Word) to store addresses and phone numbers and other personal information (such as address and phone numbers).
- ✓ An internet provider will never ask you via email to verify and give them information.
- ✓ Be sure you have a current and updated version of anti-virus software installed on your computers (yes, all of your computers). Anti-virus software can be either purchased or free. Be sure to have a program that can give you more protection than you could ever expect, including email scanning and information protection.

PLEASE DO NOT USE mcgs1972@yahoo.com email address. As a result of that hack we are closing the Yahoo email account. REMEMBER to remove the yahoo account from any of your contact lists.

Tips & Tricks for Dating, Documenting, Restoring and Storing Old Photos

Taking Stock in What Ya Got!

The first thing you need to do is find all of your old family photographs and pull them out of any old boxes or photo albums that may contain acid. Most pre-1980? photo storage is bad.

Now that you have a huge pile of old pictures you should separate them into piles with a filing system that makes sense to you. You could place all the photos of people you do not know in one file. Those photos can be researched Why can be obvious in some photos (weddings, birthdays, later. You might sort them into good photos and bad photos. Maybe sort them by surnames. You could even sort by year when you determine a time period.

Important! Never write on the back of your old photographs with a regular pen, pencil or marker. Only use a product that is safe for the photo. You can find them online, in any go to The Camera Shop in Muskegon. They have done store that has scrapbook supplies or any photo shop. The some date estimating for me before (although it was a long same holds true for storage boxes and photo albums. 99% of what you will find now are safe. Just make sure that it states this on the package.

Next, scan each photo into your computer. As you are scanning them, put them into folders you have set up for photos. Be sure to name them as something that makes sense to you.

Once the photos have been scanned in you can store your originals in safe boxes or albums. Keep those originals handy because you will want to refer to them as you repair the digital version.

Time to Date!

No, not that kind of dating--I mean determining the time periods of the photos. It just sounds fun to say start dating. Choose a picture and get out a magnifying glass and a very good light. The best are those daylight type lamps and The following books came from B3: bulbs. I love the Ott Lite and the Daylighter. They provide a crisp white light that will show you accurate and true colors of the photo.

As you glean information for your photos you need to record it and connect it to that specific photo. Now you can use a safe pencil and gently write information on the back of the photo. Do not press hard or it will push through the photo. Another way to link information to a photo is to assign the photo a number or filing code then use a master sheet to Indian House Memorial Old Deerfield, Massachusetts record all the information for that photo.

"Who, What, When, Where, and Why."

What took the picture? You can get a sense of when a photo was taken by the feel of the paper or medium (such as metal, glass Polaroid, Brownie) it was printed on. When will get your inner detective work flowing. Look at who is in the photo, what each of them is wearing from top to bottom (don't forget hats and jewelry). Look for clues in the background, This kind of goes along with where too but look for clues in buildings, signs, houses, cars, etc.

Where can be easy or impossible at times. Again, look at the background. Are they in a park, city, road, etc. If you see a sign and you have an idea it may be in Muskegon for instance, look up the area with the names on the sign to try and figure out when that company was in business.


