That means we must give our sources of information in keeping with the standards of the field.

Taking time to track down the author of a submitted item will save problems with the copyright laws. As for Della Wright and others, protection lasts a lifetime plus 70 years. Let's give credit where it is due for our use of "memes!"

At the 2016 national conference of the Federation Genealogical Societies, it was announced that the 1812 Preserve the Pension fund raising project was fully paid. Fold 3, NARA, Ancestry, FamilySearch plus 115 societies and over 4,000 individuals have contributed to the pension effort. FGS got a welcomed surprise from an anonymous donor with a \$500,000 contribution to complete the funding goal! Ancestry.com will match this amount to make a total of \$1 million. Now we can look forward to the future FREE access of the digitized 1812 War records. War of 1812 pensions are some of the most frequently requested records. #### **1891 Census of Norway**

The 1891 Census consists of one sheet per person and one sheet per house/residence. These sheets have all been scanned and published in ordered series for the 559 cities and municipalities (herred) that existed in Norway at the time of the census. Apart from name and occupation, most of the information in the census sheets is in printed letters. You need to access the information from the house lists. In these lists you will find reference to the person lists.

For Kristiania/Oslo, the address book of 1891 is scanned and available to simplify the information retrieval. Access is free. http://goo.gl/W8a4Aa

With this new partnership, DPLA will incorporate metadata from FamilySearch.org's online digital book collection that will make more than 200,000 family history books discoverable through DPLA's search portal later this.
